

Did you know?

91% of the clients who come to The Julian Center for shelter earn \$15,000 a year or less

50% of all homeless women and children in this country are fleeing domestic violence

61% of the women and children arrive at The Julian Center with no means of transportation

In the United States, a woman is beaten every 9 seconds

The Julian Center serves more than 75,000 meals and snacks every year

47% of the individuals sheltered each year are children

Four women each day and more than 1,000 women each year are killed by their partners

The Julian Center is a nonprofit agency providing counseling, safe shelter, and education for survivors of domestic violence, sexual assault, and other life crises. Through outreach and consultation, we also seek to educate the community about the issue of domestic violence and its impact on all our lives.

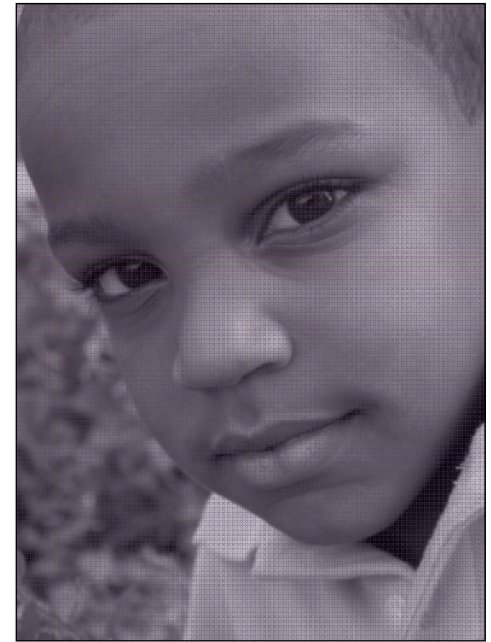

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Emergency Shelter

Provides safe shelter 24/7 for women and their children who need to escape abusive relationships

Numerous services are offered to our clients living in Emergency Shelter including: on-site medical services, access to job training, personalized case management, tutoring and mentoring programs, three meals a day, legal services, and linens

In 2010, The Julian Center provided emergency housing to 1,171 domestic violence survivors

Transitional Housing

Offers a longer-term housing option to women and families as they work to become self-sufficient

Clients have access to supportive services and can live in Transitional Housing for up to two years

Clients focus on building and/or enhancing awareness, accountability, responsibility, and empowerment

In 2010, The Julian Center New Life Transitional Housing Program assisted 56 domestic violence survivors

Reuben Counseling Center

Residents of The Julian Center and community members may receive therapy on a sliding fee scale basis

Clients benefit from individual, group and family counseling as well as our art therapy program

Younger clients benefit from play therapy

In 2010, The Julian Center counseled 820 women and children

IMPD Advocates

A joint venture with the Indianapolis Metropolitan Police Department and The Julian Center

Advocates accompany police officers on calls relating to domestic violence

Clients receive help with obtaining protective orders, emergency cell phones, domestic violence education and housing searches

In 2010, The Julian Center Family Violence Outreach Advocacy Program served 1,538 clients—a number that is continually increasing

Legal Services (317-941-2265)

Provides free legal aid to domestic violence survivors

Clients receive help with the following legal matters: separation, divorce, child custody, paternity, child support, and issues related to immigration

In 2010, The Julian Center provided legal advice and representation to 631 domestic violence survivors



Thrifty Threads (317-802-9612)

Allows domestic violence survivors to obtain much needed items with dignity and respect

Clients receive vouchers they can use to purchase clothing, furniture, and household goods

In 2010, women and children received \$50,764 worth of donated goods to help them as they exited The Julian Center

Supportive Housing

34 North contains 71 supportive housing units which provide victims of domestic violence with long-term, safe housing

Two apartment complexes have units ranging from studio to four-bedroom apartments

34 North opened its doors in July, 2010

Family Violence Outreach Advocacy

Advocates serve clients after they have left shelter and those who chose never to enter shelter

Advocates assist clients with financial problems, legal needs, obtaining food, applying for benefits, housing, employment and safety planning

In 2010, 1,551 women and children were served by the Outreach Advocates.
